



EUROPEAN BUSINESS COMMUNITY CALLS FOR THE RAPID RATIFICATION AND ENTRY INTO OPERATION OF THE UNITARY PATENT SYSTEM

EUROCHAMBRES, BUSINESSEUROPE^[1], Orgalim^[2], and SMEunited represent innovative businesses across Europe. One of our core objectives is to support innovation and boost the competitiveness of European companies, including Small and Medium-Sized Enterprises (SMEs).

Intellectual property is a key element of the EU's industrial policy to support innovation and achieve the twin objectives of the digital and climate transition. The Covid-19 crisis demonstrated the importance of having innovative companies of all sizes supported by a robust Intellectual Property Rights framework in order to both tackle a large scale crisis but also to stimulate economic recovery.

A comprehensive policy to protect inventions is therefore vital for Europe's competitiveness and its prosperity. The creation of a Unitary Patent and the Unified Patent Court^[3] is an excellent opportunity to achieve this goal. It would create a more simple and harmonised European system (a "one-stop" shop) to grant patents to our companies and it would enhance the quality and efficiency of patent protection in Europe. Such a system would bring significant benefits for our companies through increased legal certainty, cost-effectiveness, promotion of research and innovation, and global competitiveness.

For all these reasons and grasping the momentum of recent national developments in the ratification process, we call for speeding-up the (remaining) ratifications and necessary preparations in order for companies to soon be able to reap the benefits of this system.
