

About The EntreComp Community

The EntreComp Community is a rapidly growing informal network of people and organisations involved in the entrepreneurial learning ecosystem. It now engages over 700 stakeholders from 72 countries. It is a collaborative action built with the experience and expertise of members who have the common aim to connect, learn and share practices to develop the quality and reach of entrepreneurial learning across sectors and themes in lifelong learning – from early years to adult education, from STEM to start-up. The uniting element is EntreComp, the EU framework for the entrepreneurship key competence, co-created by hundreds of stakeholders led by the European Commission and now widely used to help understand, value, implement, assess, and recognise entrepreneurial competences of learners from different walks of life.

Pauline Boivin


Project and Policy Manger, Lifelong Learning Platform



social enterprises and those working to support them.



Implementing transversal competences for successful adaptation and engagement of online VET teaching and learning.

2BDigital

Co-funded by the Erasmus+ programme of the European Union, **2BDigital** is aimed at educators working with learners aged 14-19 at risk of disengagement and dropout. The project has developed an innovative framework synergising EntreComp and DigComp to support the uptake of innovative approaches and digital technologies for teaching and learning in VET. It further aims to facilitate the adaptation to the digital transition magnified by the COVID-19 pandemic.

2BDigital will train teachers all over Europe to implement an innovative online teaching and assessment methodology that will allow VET

students to promote their transversal and digital competences. This methodology is grounded in the 2BDigital Competence Framework of transversal competences for engagement in digital learning and working. The key focus areas of the project include tackling the issue of early school leaving, the design of new innovative educational methods, and the development of training courses for open and distance learning.

Creating digital strategies for sparking entrepreneurial learning

Digital Firefly

Co-funded by the Erasmus+ programme of the European Union, **Digital Firefly** aims at identifying and address the challenges teachers, trainers, and teacher-educators face in developing entrepreneurial competences through the post-pandemic New Normal, with special attention to the development of online and blended learning tools.

The **Digital Firefly** project will investigate how teachers, trainers, and teacher trainers could effectively maintain, adjust, and scale their entrepreneurial education strategies to the demands of the New Normal; train and support teachers, entrepreneurship education educators

and entrepreneurial education teacher trainers on how to use digital and remote teaching strategies and tools for delivering effective entrepreneurship learning experiences; provide practical online tools to ease





the way for teachers and trainers to ensure continuity of entrepreneurship education in online or blended learning environments; and contribute to the wider policy and research discourses on the post-COVID future of education in general and entrepreneurship education in specific.

To accomplish its objectives, the project works with teachers and trainers in secondary education and VET, teacher educators involved in pre-service or in-service training, and entrepreneurship educators involved in schools and VET who have never or only slightly been trained in digital and remote teaching strategies

EntreComp Europe

EntreComp Europe is a COSME-funded project with partners in Belgium, Italy, Spain, Moldova, and Turkey with the goal of creating national and regional EntreComp communities and exploring how EntreComp can be used in youthwork, education, employment and enterprise.

EntreComp is the European framework which identifies transversal competences that define an entrepreneurial mindset. These competences can be used to support entrepreneurial learning in different settings – corporates, SMES and start-ups, civil society, social economy, education, youth work, but also within the community and, more broadly,

as individual and citizens. Entrepreneurship competences are increasingly recognised as competences for life, relevant to personal development and fulfilment, finding and progressing in employment, as well as initiating new ventures ranging from community campaigns, social enterprises to new start-up businesses.

EntreComp4Transition

EntreComp4Transition aims at developing new, innovative, multidisciplinary approaches to teaching and learning paving the way for the future 'Green Transition Facilitator' by fostering an entrepreneurial mindset, facilitating co-creation, and ensuring recognition of learning outcomes.

Co-funded by the European Union, the project will rely on country clusters forging innovative alliances to support teachers, trainers, businesses, and end users in the learning pathway. Activities include an in-depth analysis of skills gaps, the development a dual blended methodology with innovative learning content delivered via a MOOC in line with ECVET and

EQAVET frameworks, pilot sessions, a mobility scheme, and the creation of open badges to support HE/VET and enable businesses to verify acquired competences.

The project will also produce a sustainable AI-based tool to support companies in identifying skill gaps and raise their competitiveness. More than 30.000 stakeholders across the EU ranging from businesses, HEIs, VET providers, public authorities, civil society, and students will be involved and directly benefit from the project in the short-term and/or long-term. Thanks to its well-defined governance at national level, the EntreComp for Transition project is designed to gather actors together in a strong alliance for





innovation, the results of which will bring benefits to each of them, to different contexts and beyond in the long-term.

Erasmus for Young Entrepreneurs

Erasmus for Young Entrepreneurs helps provide aspiring European entrepreneurs with the skills necessary to start and/or successfully run a small business in Europe. New entrepreneurs gather and exchange knowledge and business ideas with an experienced entrepreneur, with whom they stay and collaborate for a period of 1 to 6 months. The stay is partly financed by the European Commission.

As a new entrepreneur, you will benefit from onthe-job training in a small or medium-sized enterprise in another Participating Country. This will ease the successful start of your business or strengthen your new enterprise. You can also

benefit from access to new markets, international cooperation and potential possibilities for collaboration with business partners abroad.

As a host entrepreneur, you can benefit from fresh ideas from a motivated new entrepreneur on your business. He may have specialised skills or knowledge in an area you do not master, which could also complement yours. Most host entrepreneurs enjoyed the experience so much that they decide to host other new entrepreneurs afterwards.

It is really a win-win collaboration whereby both of you can also discover new European markets or business partners, different ways of doing business.
